Chair Words A message from Chapter Chair, Bert Yost

What should we call the winter of 2012? It is certainly setting records, but not the kind that those of us that enjoy winter outdoor activities appreciate. I have been in the woods quite a bit this winter. You still have to walk the dog or split firewood. And this year I have sore arms from chopping ice on our driveway. Although there is not enough ice for skating or ice fishing, there certainly is enough ice to make walking in the woods without crampons dangerous. Cross country skiing is all but impossible. I only managed to make it out 6 times so far this season. If it weren't for snowmaking, there would be no downhill skiing at Whiteface. The only thing we can hope for is that winter will eventually come to the North Country this year.

There is an issue that some members have asked me to discuss with the Chapter so I thought that this column would be an appropriate place to start such a discussion. Many of you are probably aware of the group that is trying to have the Adirondack Railroad converted to a Rail Trail. More information can be found at http://www.thearta.org.

As a business owner and taxpayer, I support it. The idea of a world class bike trail connecting Old Forge to Lake Placid is very exciting. On a recent trip to the Orlando area, Heike and I rode on such a trail. It was called the West Orange Bike Trail - http://www.bikeflorida.net/west_orange_trail.htm. It was an amazing trail. All along this trail old stations were converted to bike shops, museums, community centers with play grounds, or just as rest stops along the trail. The trail ran through the center of Winter Garden. This was the most bike friendly town that I have ever visited. All along the main street, there were bike racks in front of every café, restaurant, or shop. On the weekend that we biked there the town was filled with cyclists, runners, and walkers. It was really amazing to see how well the trail was utilized.

If something like could happen on our rail corridor, it would provide more economic benefits to our area than the existing train. I think with the current funding situation in the US, it is highly unlikely that we will ever see commercial rail traffic on the Old Forge – Lake Placid corridor. In the long run, I believe that this is a much better use than the Adirondack Railroad. I encourage you as Chapter members to think about this issue and to discuss it with others. It is certainly within our charter to support such a trail and I would like to hear your opinions.

Guidelines for Participating in Hurricane Mountain Chapter Outings

- MUST CALL trip leader 24 hours in advance to register unless otherwise designated.
- Be willing to sign the liability form (required by ADK)
- Total participants including trip leader(s) is 15 for day hikes. (DEC/ADK standards)
- Check distance and ascent in the hike description, or check with leader.
- · Check hike rating. Know your capabilities.
- Wear appropriate clothing and footwear.
- Take an extra water bottle.

Guide to Hurricane Mt. Chapter Hike Ratings

- A+ Very Strenuous: Rugged terrain, steep climbing (over 2500' elevation gain) and/or long distances (over 12 miles). Participants should be experienced and in excellent condition.
- A Strenuous: Possible steep ascents (1500-2500' gain) and/or distances of 10-15 miles. Can be demanding. Expect faster rate of travel. Participants should be experienced and in excellent condition.
- B Moderate: Elevation gains 1000'-1500' and approximately 5-9 miles distance. Expect rolling hills and short steep climbing. Participants should be in good physical condition.
- C Easy: Hiking/walking under 5 miles with very gradual or no climbing

Sunday, May 13 Forest Wildflower Study

Forest Wildflower Study needs volunteers. ATBI Mountain Watch Phenology Study on Whiteface will be starting this spring and needs volunteers to note the bloom times and fruiting times of 5 forest wildflowers at three permanent plots on Whiteface Mountain. We will meet in parking lot A at the Whiteface ski area at 9:00AM for a training session and then hike up the ski slopes to the first site at 2400 feet (near the midstation), then to 3600 feet (summit of Little Whiteface) and then to 4400 feet (near the summit chair lift on Whiteface). We will be checking for flowering and fruiting stages of Canada Mayflower, Painted Trillium, Blue Bead Lily, Bunchberry and Hobblebush. Ideally we would like 3 or 4 different people to sign up for different dates, so one person is not climbing the mountain all summer to get this data. Other dates are May 26, June 2, and June 16, continuing through July, August and September. Contact leader for more details.

Historic Red Rock, which appeared on the first topographic map of the area issued in 1898, has great views over a 200 ft cliff of ancient quartzite rock.
